BIOGRAPHIES

Jasmine Pigott, tuba

Jasmine "Jazzie" Pigott began to play the tuba at the age of 10 after accidentally choosing the trombone and playing that for a year, and she quickly excelled. In 2016, Pigott became the first black woman to place in the International Leonard Falcone Tuba Student Competition. As a college junior in 2018, Pigott was invited to be a solo artist on the "Promising Artists of the 21st Century" concert series tour in Costa Rica. There, she realized her true passion for performing for people of marginalized backgrounds. Since then, Pigott has become an activist for increasing the diversity in the field of classical music. With this mission, she has participated in research projects, performed concerts in marginalized communities, and developed performance-based projects and presentations. In February 2020, Pigott was awarded the first prize in the Michigan State University Running Start Competition for her grant proposal to commission composers of color to write tuba pieces in black music styles for her EP, Revolution: The Next Generation of Tuba Music released in July 2022. Pigott is a co-founder for the Chromatic Brass Collective — an organization devoted to empowering women and non-binary people of color who are brass musicians.

Today, when she's not studying, Jasmine actively performs, composes, writes, and researches with a goal to inspire the next generation of black musicians. Outside of her musical endeavors, Pigott enjoys a career as a certified personal trainer and runs a health and wellness blog and podcast, *Harmony and Healing*, to empower musicians and black people to incorporate fitness into their lives.

Pigott holds Bachelor of Music degrees in music education and tuba performance from Ithaca College and a Master of Music degree in tuba performance from Michigan State University. She is currently attending the Peabody Conservatory at Johns Hopkins University for her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in tuba performance.

Joseph Young, conductor

Praised for his suavely adventurous programing, Joseph Young is increasingly recognized as "one of the most gifted conductors of his generation." Young is music director of the Berkeley Symphony, Ruth Blaustein Rosenberg Artistic Director Of Ensembles for the Peabody Conservatory, and resident conductor of the National Youth Orchestra — U.S.A. at Carnegie Hall. In recent years, he has made appearances with the Saint Louis Symphony, Buffalo Philharmonic, Colorado Symphony, Detroit Symphony, Phoenix Symphony, Bamberger Symphoniker, New World Symphony Orchestra, Spoleto Festival Orchestra, Orquestra Sinfónica do Porto Casa da Música, and the Orquesta Sinfonica y Coro de RTVE (Madrid), among others in the U.S. and Europe.

In his most recent role Young served as the assistant conductor of the Atlanta Symphony where he conducted more than 50 concerts per season. Young also served as the music director of the Atlanta Symphony Youth Orchestra, where he was the driving force behind the ensemble's artistic growth. Previous appointments have included resident conductor of the Phoenix Symphony, and the League of American Orchestras Conducting Fellow with Buffalo Philharmonic and Baltimore Symphony.

Young is a recipient of the 2015 Solti Foundation U.S. Career Assistance Award for young conductors, an award he also won in 2008, and 2014. In 2013, Young was a semi-finalist in the Gustav Mahler International Conducting Competition (Bamberg, Germany). In 2011, he was one out of six conductors featured in the League of American Orchestras' prestigious Bruno Walter National Conductor Preview.

Young completed graduate studies with Gustav Meier and Markand Thakar at the Peabody Conservatory in 2009, earning an artist's diploma in conducting. He has been mentored by many world-renowned conductors including Jorma Panula, Robert Spano, and Marin Alsop, with whom he continues to maintain a close relationship.
